## Gustar 2

In English we say: We like ice cream.

In Spanish we say: Ice cream pleases us.

**Nos gusta el helado.**

In cases where a specific person or person's name is the object (the person who finds it pleasing) of the sentence, the "a personal" must go before the person. In the example below, the "a personal" is the used in this statement because person is a specific object.

Christina likes to eat cookies.

**A Christina le gusta comer las galletas.** (Eating cookies is pleasing to Christina.)

Sam likes to walk to school.

**A Sam le gusta ir a pie a las clases.** (Walking to school is pleasing to Sam.)

Sarah likes dogs.

**A Sarah le gustan los perros.** (The dogs are pleasing to Sarah.)
